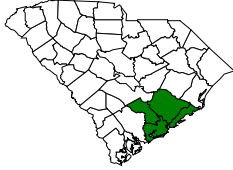

2009 HIV/AIDS summary: DHEC Public Health Region 7



New HIV infections (including AIDS cases), 2007-2008

Region 7 includes three counties: Berkeley, Charleston and Dorchester.

HIV infected people are the #1 priority population for HIV prevention services in S.C. For the two-year period 2007-2008, 210 people were newly diagnosed with HIV in the counties comprising Region 7. This represents 14 percent of the total cases diagnosed in South Carolina. The number of new cases diagnosed and reported in Region 7 during 2007-2008 decreased by 10 percent compared to the 2001-2002 period.

By gender, 73 percent of new HIV/AIDS cases occur among men; 27 percent are among women.

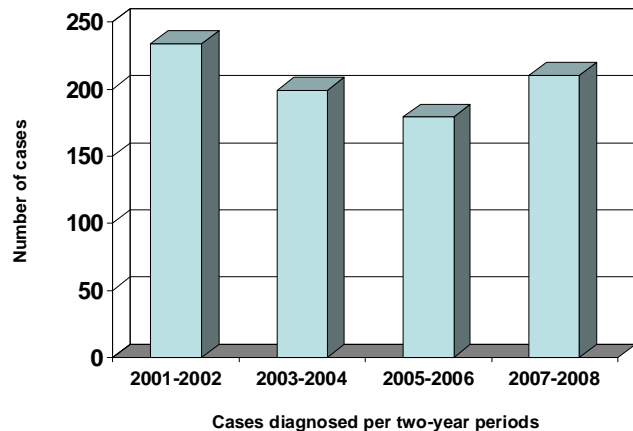
By risk, among the 118 people who report risk in Region 7, men who have sex with men (MSM) represent the largest proportion of recent infections (53 percent), followed closely by men who have sex with women (MSW) and women who have sex with men (WSM) (39 percent). Eight percent were infected through injecting drug use (IDU).

By race/ethnicity, among people diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in Region 7, 69 percent are African-American; 24 percent are white; six percent are Hispanic. African-Americans have a case rate six times greater than whites in Region 7. The proportion of recent infections in Region 7 that are Hispanic/Latino is greater than the proportion of the Hispanic/Latino population in Region 7 (six percent vs. four percent).

Among women recently diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in Region 7, most are African-American (70 percent); 18 percent are white; 11 percent are Hispanic. Of the 26 women reporting risk, all indicated heterosexual sex as their exposure to HIV.

Among men recently diagnosed in Region 7, 69 percent are African-American; 27 percent are white; four percent are Hispanic. Of the 86 men reporting risk, 71 percent are men who have sex with men, 22 percent are exposed through heterosexual sex.

Total people living with HIV/AIDS through December 2008*

As of December 2008, 2,140 people have been reported living with HIV infection (including AIDS) who are residents of Public Health Region 7. This represents 15 percent of the S.C. total. Of these, 1,522 are men and 618 are women. Most people (1,309) are between 25-49 years of age; 23 are children and teenagers under 20 years of age.

As with new infections, African-Americans are disproportionately impacted. Most (43 percent) of the people living with HIV in Region 7 are African-American men, 25 percent are white men, 23 percent are African-American women and five percent are white women. Three percent of people living with HIV are Hispanic/Latino.

Most (44 percent) people living with HIV who reported risks are men who have sex with men; 33 percent are men and women exposed through heterosexual sex; 21 percent are injecting drug users.

3. In 2007, Hispanics/Latinos made up 3.5 percent of the population of DHEC Public Health Region 7. Among people recently diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in Region 7, six percent are Hispanic/Latino. Three percent of people living with HIV in the health region are Hispanic/Latino.
