




These pills will treat your infection so that you won't get sick with TB.

The pills **won't work** unless you take them exactly as instructed.

If you see other doctors, be sure to tell them that you are taking pills to prevent TB and show them this record.

Let us know about any other pills you are taking.



Problems with these pills are rare, but they can happen.

If you notice any of these problems, stop taking your pills and call your TB nurse as soon as possible.

- *Loss of appetite*
- *Always feeling tired for no reason*
- *Dark colored urine (the color of coffee or tea)*
- *Yellow eyeballs*
- *Yellow skin*
- *Sick to your stomach*
- *Rash, itching*
- *High fever*
- *Blurred vision*
- *Pain or tingling in hands, feet, or joints*
- *Feeling dizzy or sleepy*
- *Any other problems*

We need to see you often to make sure your pills are working.

Together we can cure TB!

- *Bring your pill bottle and this booklet with you to all your appointments with your TB nurse.*
- *Take your pills exactly as instructed.*
- *Don't forget to use the calendar to help you keep track of your daily pill dose.*
- *Keep your appointments.*
