



Financial Summary

All health department facilities in Region 5 are located in county funded buildings. Region 5 assesses its budget from two perspectives, "home health" and "all other services."



2012 Annual Refresher Trainings – Culturally & Linguistically Appropriate Services and HIPAA
 202 refresher courses are required every year for all staff.



Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Trainings – There are nine PHEP trainings that are required. DHEC’s Role in Emergency Operations, IS-100, and IS-700 are required for all staff. IS-200, ICS-300, ICS-400, IS-701, IS-703, and IS-704 are required by staff with more in depth roles in an emergency situation. Their level of trainings required will depend on their individual role.

Children with Special Health Care Needs (CSHCN)

Children with special health care needs are those who have or are at risk for chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional conditions and who also require health and related services of a type or amount beyond that required by children generally.

DHEC services are available to assist children with a variety of chronic illnesses and physically disabling conditions. Key services offered are: Information and referrals, care coordination, payment assistance, and Camp Burnt Gin. CSHCN payment programs consist of CRS which is a program for children and young adults up to age 18 with a wide array of conditions requiring specialized medical care. Also, CSHCN provides payment assistance for hearing, orthodontia, and hemophilia.



Community Health / Chronic Disease Prevention / Health Education / Health Promotion

Assists local communities with promoting positive public health policies and environmental changes that will ultimately prevent heart disease and stroke, cancer, diabetes, obesity, and injury and violence.

Community Health, EPI and Immunizations host an annual school nurse workshop just before the start of each new school year. This allows the school nurses in our area to receive new or up to date information regarding immunization requirements, school exclusion laws and health education. CEU's / contact hours have been offered in the past.

Eat Smart Move More (ESMM) Groups

The SC Eat Smart Move More Coalition coordinates obesity prevention efforts across the state and leads the implementation of South Carolina's Obesity Prevention Plan.

The Region currently has local ESMM chapters in Aiken, Allendale and Orangeburg. These groups are working on many different projects around healthy eating and obesity.



Environmental Health Services

Provides regulatory, training, and technical assistance services in food protection, general sanitation, rabies and vector control (rats, mosquitoes, ticks, etc), and onsite wastewater management.

Region 5 Environmental Health has been working to effectively coordinate and manage environmental health responses to improve health outcomes. Region 5 has identified three priority areas for Environmental Health:

1. Animal Exposures / Bites - Public health environmental staff investigate animal bite reports and act accordingly to prevent the spread of disease.
2. Food Establishment Inspections - Ensure that food service establishments operate in a safe and sanitary manner to minimize the occurrence of food borne illnesses. This includes inspection of facilities where food is processed, prepared or served.
3. Septic Tank Permitting / Waste Disposal – Environmental health programs ensure that septic tanks and other on-site sewage disposal systems are properly planned, installed and operated to prevent the spread of disease.


At the end of 2011, there were 1,145 permitted food service facilities in Region 5. Staff conducted 1,704 surprise inspections in food service facilities, issued 56 new permits, performed 281 preliminary site inspections, and completed 703 follow up inspections. There were 198 food service complaint investigations performed in 2011, with 65 of them determined to be valid.

In the onsite wastewater (septic tank) program, 785 permits were issued, 304 sites were unsuitable for a conventional system, and 666 installations of septic systems were approved. Staff investigated 179 wastewater complaints, with 111 of them being valid.

Family Planning

Provides high quality, low or no-cost, reproductive health care to women, men and teens.

Family Planning / HIV Grant

The grant became effective October 1, 2007. Services are provided only in the Orangeburg site. In 2011, the Family Planning caseload for the Orangeburg County Health Department was 3,332. The following information gives a breakdown of the number of clients tested by age, race, and ethnicity:

- 467 were < 19 yrs., 2,790 were older than 19 yrs., 485 were White, 2, 714 were black, 58 were Hispanic, 64 were other and 11 were non-specified.
- Since June 2011, 1,336 family planning clients and their partners were tested for HIV. 1,219 were done via the conventional method and 104 were done through rapid testing. Thirteen clients refused testing.
- Of those tested for HIV, all but 86 received their test results and post-test counseling.
- Two clients were identified as positive and immediately linked into care.
- Contacts continue to be made within the community to provide outreach.

Home Health Services

Home Health Services provides health care in the home as prescribed by a doctor. Services include skilled nursing, physical therapy, social work and aide services. Many state-of-the-art medical treatments can be administered safely in the home. DHEC Home Health serves patients with acute or chronic illnesses of all socio-economic levels.

Region 5 Home Health Services is dedicated to the provision of high quality home care for the clients we serve. All Region 5 DHEC Home Care Nurses have achieved a significant level of competency after proving their skills in advanced knowledge of Wound VAC (Vacuum Assisted Closure) a type of wound care dressing.

In fiscal year 2011 Region 5 Home Health staff made 11,373 visits to 515 clients with patients/caregivers reporting a high level of satisfaction with the care provided.

Region 5 Service Areas

Immunizations (shots)

Provided to protect children and adults from diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), polio, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella (chicken pox), hepatitis A, hepatitis B, rotavirus, influenza, pneumococcal disease, haemophilus influenzae type b, meningococcal disease, and human papillomavirus. South Carolina law requires children entering a public or private school to be immunized. Children who attend day care are mandated to be age appropriately vaccinated as well.

SC Vaccine for Children Program is managed by SC DHEC Immunization Division. In 2012, Region 5 has 28 public and 12 private providers enrolled in the program. VFC site visits are performed by the region to evaluate provider compliance with VFC Program protocols. Annually, 50% of providers in Region 5 are visited.



2010 Flu Data



Postpartum/Newborn Home Visits

Provides home visits to Medicaid eligible postpartum mothers and newborn infants to assess, evaluate, educate, counsel and refer for additional care as needed.

Pregnancy Testing

Provides assessment and referrals for pregnant women. Services include: pregnancy tests, risk assessments, and help finding a prenatal doctor.

Public Health Emergency Preparedness

Coordinates emergency services to the public in the event of bioterrorism, epidemics, and other public health threats.

- Exercises for 2011-2012: Our regions conducted a series of exercises to meet our basic requirements for state and federal regulations. We did one NDMS exercise in conjunction with Georgia. We used our Mobile Medical unit to set up a remote surgery to handle coronary-based survivors from a disaster. Also we exercised our response actions to a FNF event at Plant Volgte in Georgia and was evaluated by the FEMA throughout the event. Another FSE was our alternate EOC setup done in September 2011 that tested our abilities to operate our EOC under austere conditions using our own resources to provide power. We tested our communications with all the hospitals in the Region simulating a tornado strike on 3 of the hospitals and the subsequent evacuation of these hospitals along the Medical Surge capacity needed at the two remaining hospitals.
- Plan updates: The SNS plan was evaluated and updated to be in compliance with state and federal regulations
- HPP events: The regions hospitals ran a three day training event in Myrtle Beach designed to put all of our hospitals on the same basis for hospital operations in accordance with JAYCO standards.
- Training: Our region conducted classes in ICS 300 for the employees who will sit in the county EOCs.




