Backyard Composting

Gardening and landscaping debris (such as leaves and grass clippings) account for as much as 20 percent of all waste disposed. So it makes sense to compost.

By composting leaves, yard trimmings and food scraps, you can reduce waste and easily create a rich soil additive for your flower beds and gardens.

ITEMS TO RECYCLE	WHERE TO RECYCLE (Refer to the map on the back for center/site locations.)
ALUMINUM CANS	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
APPLIANCES, LARGE (e.g., refrigerators, washers, dryers)	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
BATTERIES (car, truck, boat and lawn mower batteries)	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
CARDBOARD, CORRUGATED	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
ELECTRONICS (e.g., desktop, laptop and notebook computers, monitors, televisions, printers)	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
FARMER OIL (oil from farm equipment – limit 55 gallons per visit)	Beaver Dam Recycling Center ONLY
METAL, SCRAP (e.g., stoves, grills, bicycles)	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
NEWSPAPER, INSERTS AND MAGAZINES	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
OFFICE PAPER	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
OIL BOTTLES	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
OIL FILTERS	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
OIL/GASOLINE MIXTURES	Newberry Recycling Center ONLY
PLASTIC BOTTLES (plastic bottles marked with a #1 or #2 ONLY – usually on the bottom)	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
STEEL/METAL FOOD CANS	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
TIRES (passenger vehicle tires – limit four per visit)	Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station (<i>EXCEPT</i> the Newberry Recycling Center)
USED MOTOR OIL	ALL Newberry County Recycling Centers <i>AND</i> the Transfer Station
YARD TRIMMINGS (e.g., tree limbs, brush, Christmas trees)	The Transfer Station ONLY

Why is recycling important?

- Recycling prevents materials from going into a landfill.
- Recycling saves money and creates jobs.
- Recycling saves natural resources like trees and petroleum.

How should items be prepared for recycling?

- Separate recyclables from your household trash.
- Rinse bottles, cans and jars.
- Flatten cardboard, aluminum cans, plastic bottles and steel cans. This will help save space.
- Keep paper (e.g., newspaper, inserts, magazines) dry.
- At the recycling centers, place recyclables in the correct containers.
- When in doubt, ask!



There's more you can do to protect the environment in Newberry County.

- **Reduce paper usage.** Use both sides of a sheet of paper. Use fewer paper towels or use cloth ones instead. Sign up for electronic billing.
- **Compost and grasscycle.** Compost food scraps and yard trimmings. Leave grass clippings on your lawn where they will decompose quickly and add nutrients.
- **Reuse it.** Use cloth or canvas shopping bags as well as reusable plates, cups and utensils.

- **Recycle used motor oil, bottles and filters.** It's easy to do. All Newberry County Recycling Centers and the Transfer Station accept these items. The following petroleum products also ARE ACCEPTED in used motor oil collection tanks: hydraulic fluid; gear oil; diesel fuel; kerosene; automatic transmission fluid; and power-steering fluid. **DO NOT** place these items in collection tanks: antifreeze; Varsol; brake fluid; paint; paint thinner; refrigeration oil; or any solvent, cleaner or substance used to clean paint brushes.

- **It's the law to recycle electronics in South Carolina.** Household electronics are accepted at all Newberry County Recycling Centers and the Transfer Station. In addition, many manufacturers and retailers offer consumer recycling options.
