
Dear Ms. Basil:

SEACO Emulsions is planning to install odor control on the liquid asphalt storage tanks at the facility. Following is a description of the odor control system.

- Tanks will be modified to include CPVC duct pipe that connects to the vent of each tank and runs down to ground level.
- There, the duct will connect to a carbon canister which removes the odor from the tank emission stream.
- The outlet of the canister is connected to a vacuum blower which pulls the stream from the tank, through the canister and vents to the atmosphere.
- The outlet of the vacuum will be monitored weekly for efficiency.
- Canisters will be replaced when their absorption ability meets its threshold.

Since the purpose of this equipment is only to control odors and is not intended to be a pollution control device, SEACO, Inc. is requesting that the equipment be exempt from air quality permitting. The device is not intended to be used as an emission control device, but as an odor control device. We wanted to take this opportunity to inform SCDHEC of our intent to install the odor control device on a voluntary basis and to receive concurrence from the Department that a Construction Permit will not be required from the Bureau of Air Quality.
